Dear Friends:

It is our opinion that ICTC to be built in the nation's capital is a unique and exciting opportunity which may well surpass the Peace Corps and Vista in the actual realization of its high goals and we hope that students will be able to contribute much to the formation and administration of this project. Those of us already involved and informed about the project believe that we have a chance to accomplish a goal which really would improve educational, cultural and trade aspects of the world. As students and deeply concerned citizens, we see ICTC as a welcome and positive solution to our widely shared feelings of frustrations as to the present world situation.

Our immediate goal is to form a national student organization which will support the ICTC Foundation. Students are now represented on the Board of Directors of this Foundation. The establishment of a national organization will serve in part to increase the student voice on this Board in order that we may be principal architects in the formation of an enterprise and a structure in Washington which will serve, without political or vested interest influence, the cause of better understanding between the world's peoples.

We hope to organize chapters to support this organization on each of the nation's campuses to involve students both in the planning of this cultural center and in fund raising activities to support it.

At this time we are attempting to locate and identify students on other campuses who will join with us in this cause and undertake the beginning of a chapter at their college or university. A brochure describing the enterprise in greater detail has been prepared. We plan to hold a constitutional convention to formally culminate this organization in the Fall with the tentative location in Baltimore, Md. and with representatives from as many of the nation's campuses as possible.
